THE SERIES AND THE VOLUMES OF EPILEPSIA -AN ESSAY IN CONFUSION

Epilepsia has had a confusing system of numbering its issues, due to the interruption of publication on three occasions (creating four 'series') and changes in editorial policy. The original concept was of a single volume annually, each comprising four quarterly issues. Actually, in 6 years of its existence, only five volumes were produced. When the second series was initiated in 1937, it was planned to have one volume covering a 4-year period, with one issue a year. This scheme was followed between 1937 and 1948, but the last volume (IV) comprised only two issues before publication again ceased. When Epilepsia was resuscitated again in 1952, it was intended to publish one volume in a single issue each year. This plan was followed for 4 years and again publication ceased. The fourth series was launched in 1959, with one volume a year comprising initially four issues each year. The first volume actually occupied 2 years and contained five issues. In 1978, the journal expanded to six issues a year, and in 1995 there was a further major increase in size to 12 issues a year. The term 'series IV' was dropped in 1974, although the volume numbering (i.e. 1974 = volume 15) was continued.
