



From the wildlife to the nightlife, Nairobi is a city unlike any other. With a fantastic music scene, excellent international restaurants and an endless and colourful array of shops and markets, Nairobi is a city that will appeal to all walks of life.

Credit Cards and ATMs

Traveller's cheques are widely accepted, and many hotels and restaurants accept credit cards. Most banks in Kenya are equipped to advance cash on credit cards. Many banks have 24-hour ATM machines.

Currency

The official currency is the Kenya Shilling (KSh). Notes are 50, 100, 200, 500 and 1000 shillings. Coins are 1, 5, 10, 20 and 40 shillings. Visitors to Kenya should change foreign currency at banks, bureaux de change or authorised hotels. The easiest currencies to exchange are US Dollars, Pounds Sterling and Euro. There are no restrictions on the amount of foreign currency that can be brought into Kenya. Before departure, travellers are advised to convert any excess Kenyan Shillings into foreign currency. Departure taxes may be paid in local or foreign currency.

The congress will have a different theme each day. Day one will focus on diagnosis, management of epilepsy and special populations. Day two will cover management gap, comorbidities, as well as research in Africa; and day three concentrates on primary healthcare and the way forward.

The programme contains a balanced mix of plenary sessions, topical lectures, lively interactive sessions and thought-provoking workshops.

A highlight of the programme is a special session where four Past Presidents of ILAE focus on a reflection of their own experiences, the progress and challenges of epilepsy in Africa or the developing world.
