ASEPA Teaching Course on Focal Epilepsy

January 29-30. 2011, Karachi, Pakistan

This is a brief report on the Workshop on Focal Epilepsy initit ed by AS EPA.

Pakistan has a population of 1 80 million. There are about 120 qualified neur dogists, 200 neurosurgeons and 400 psychiatrists who may be involved in epilepsy treatment. MRI and CT are widely available, digital EEG is also distributed, but very few Video-EEGs. SPECT in some institution, but no PET is available. Epilepsy care is mostly supplied at primary care level. Secondary/tertiar y care is available in 12 general neurology units in Pakistan. No established epilepsy surgery units, only lesionectomy was done. Non-compliance is a problem, due to insufficient insurance system. NGO-sponsored National Epilepsy Centre (NEC) is a tertiar y care center for diagnosis and treatment as well as national coordination for need ical educationand public education. OPDstarted in 2007 and presently there were 3735 patients registered with regular medicine supply for 30 days. There was a meeting on epilepsy in 2006. It is hoped that the workshop will stinulate no reductors in Pakistan to work towards developing and supporting treatment of epilepsy, especially with consideration for epilepsy surgery.

The workshop was organized by Epilepsy Association of Pakistan (EAP), which has currently 70-80 members. Members of the local organizing committee we're Prof Hasan Aziz (chair: Emeritus Professor of Neurology, President of National Epilepsy Centre), Prof Shaukat Ali (President, EAP) and Dr. Zarine Mogal (general secretary, EAP). The workshop was held at Pearl-Continent al Hotel, Karachi. Prof Hasan Aziz, Prof Shaukat Ali and Inoue gave the opening addresses. The cost for foreign lecturers was covered by the fund raised to Japan Epilepsy Society (ASEPA fund) by several Japanese pharmaceutial companies. Some local pharmaceutial companies covered the rest.

International speakers included Dr s. Neshige R, Koide Y and Inoue Y (Japan), and local speakers were Drs. Minhas F, Mogal Z and Prof Aziz H. Initially two speakers from India were included but unable to get Visa due to strained diplomatic relations. The present speakers covered their presentations. There were 12 lectures with the following topics and 3 case discussion sessions with interesting cases presented by delegates:

General introduction to focal epi leps y
Incidence, etid ogy and genes
Mesial temporal lobe epilepsy
Neocortial epi leps y
Seizure semiology: adult
Seizure semiology: child
Lateralization and local ization
Neurophysiology
Neuroimagings
Medical treatment
Surgical treatment
Epilepsy care in Pakistan/future direction

Lectures were conducted in English. Overall, partii pants found that the workshop helped to stim late their interest in the development of epileptology in Pakistan. All lecturers and the local organizers were greatly appreciated for their kind partii pation—in the workshop despite having their busy schedule. All partii pants received a certifiate of attendance.

The workshop was followed by 4-days EEG training workshops by Dr. R Neshige held in Karachi and Lahore. Topics were: Normal EEG (child, adult, elderly), Sleep EEG, Artfact, Hand -on (how to place electrode and how to read EEGs), Focal epileptform patterns, Generalized epileptform patterns, and Non-epileptogenic patterns. These trainings were highly appreciated by the partition pattern and shown a desire to attend further such workshops.

The number of partitipants was as follows; Karachi focal epi lepsy workshop -110; Karachi EEG workshop -65; Lahore EEG workshop -90.

There was an ASEPA-ASNA EEG certitate exam ination part 1 on 30 January, for which 18 candidates took the examination.
