Also inaugurated during the congress were the ILAE, IBE executive committee. The first meeting of the ILAE executive committee was held at the congress with sole aim familiarizing itself with the structure, operations and finances of the ILAE.

At the congress the new ILAE Executive Committee, Joint executive committees of the ILAE and the International Bureau of Epilepsy (IBE) were inaugurated. Other activities which took

place at the congress included chapters presentation and handing over ceremonies by the outgoing President, Secretary general and Treasurer.

Dr. Kakooza the incoming Chairperson of CAA gave a joint lecture with Prof. Gretchen Birbeck of University of Rochester Medical Center, USA (adjunct faculty in University of Zambia and at Queen Elizabeth Central Hospital in Blantyre, Malawi) on 'Epilepsy Case Management in Resource Limited settings'. An informal meeting of the African delegates from Africa was held where suggestions were made on how to improve epilepsy care in African. There was emphasis on the need to incorporate prevailing sociocultural factors in Africa along with treatment strategies. These positions were also supported by the in-coming president of the IBE, Prof, M Brodie who proposed that more epilepsy programs should be developed in order to improve the funding of epilepsy research in Africa.

<u>NEWS:</u> TRAINING ON EEG RECORDING AND DATA INTERPRETATION HELD BY NIGERIAN LEAGUE AGAINST EPILEPSY & NIGERIAN SOCIETY OF NEUROLOGICAL SCIENCES

University of Ilorin Teaching Hospital, located in Ilorin, North-central Nigeria, hosted the 49th Annual General Meeting and Scientific conference of the Nigerian Society of Neurological Sciences between 11th and 14th of July 2017. As part of the program of events, a preconference workshop took place which featured Hands-on training on Electroencephalogram (EEG) recording and data interpretation. The training took place at the clinical skills laboratory of the College of Health sciences, University of Ilorin. The program was organised to improve the

skills of young neurologist and medical personnel in EEG recording and data interpretation. Participants included Neurologists, Neurology trainees, Psychiatrists, electrophysiologists, EEG technicians and Nurses. Resources persons were drawn from Nigerian and United Kingdom, including Prof E O Sanya, Dr Steve Coates from Teleeeg a UK based organisation involved on online EEG reported and machine donation to resource scarce counties.

The Cameroon League Against Epilepsy (CLAE) as part of programs to mark the International Epilepsy Day, organised a training workshop for general practitioners on various aspects of Epilepsy on the 8th of February 2018. The program took place in the city of Douala, which is the economic capital of Cameroon. The training workshop which was opened by the hospital director, Professor L R Njock, took place in the conference room of the Douala Laquinitinie hospital.

Topics taken during the session were basically on epilepsy definition, classification, pathophysiology, diagnosis and management; while a short paper was presented on new perspective on epilepsy research focusing on relationship between Onchocerciasis and epilepsy in Cameroon. The program was well attended and well covered by major media outlets.

COMING EVENTS: THE NEUROLOGICAL ASSOCIATION OF SOUTH AFRICA ANNOUNCES ONLINE EEG TRAINING. (commence - Monday May 14th, 2018. The last date for applications is April 30th 2018)

The Neurological Association of South Africa, in association with the Division of Neurology of the University of Cape Town, has developed a Web-based, multimodal, distance learning program (EEG online) which is primarily designed to assist in the training of career neurology registrars in the principles and practice of clinical EEG.

EEG online provides participants with a sound introduction to the art and science of performing, reading and clinically applying EEG. Succinct text is provided, but the emphasis of the teaching is on the interpretation of many normal and abnormal EEG epochs which are presented in the course material. The online course is divided into different 1 to 3-weekly modules will run for a period of 6 months. EEG online Participants who are successful in the end of course examinations are provided with a certificate endorsed by the Neurological Association of South Africa.

PAEDIATRIC EPILEPSY TRAINING COURSES IN AFRICA

The British Paediatric Neurology Association (BPNA) have developed a series of short and focused teaching courses which have been so successful in the United Kingdom (UK), that they have been rolled out internationally. These Paediatric Epilepsy Training courses have been run across Asia (especially India and Myanmar) and are now becoming established in Africa. The first African PET course was undertaken in Sudan in January 2015. The plan is to provide paediatric epilepsy training programs all across Africa by training the trainers. The content of the PET1 course is carefully tailored to target high impact health issues of the child presenting with convulsions, from how to recognise a seizure, best care for febrile seizures, developing comprehensive care plans for children with epilepsy and addressing the significant comorbidities faced by children with epilepsy.
